Dear Parent/Carer,

Next term, children will be learning about health, growing-up and changes to their body in PSHE. This is part of the Government's Relationships, Sex and Health Education programme, most of which is a legal requirement for all primary school children.

Our school's RSHE policy is available in full on our website, however, a breakdown of what children learn in each year group is attached. Below is an overview of which parts are now a legal requirement.

Primary health education is a legal requirement and this term will focus on:

- How boys and girls bodies change as they grow, including puberty.
- The importance of hygiene and safety in taking care of oneself.
- The menstruation cycle and its impact on people's physical and mental health.
- The impact of growth on mental health.

Primary <u>relationships education</u> is a legal requirement and this term will focus on:

- Different types and forms of relationships.
- The role and significance of families and friendships.
- How to form and maintain relationships that are safe and respectful.
- The dangers of manipulative relationships and how to seek help.

Primary <u>sex education</u> is <u>not</u> a <u>legal requirement but is strongly recommended</u> for primary schools. This means parents can request to withdraw their children from this content. At our school, this only includes a single part (delivered in one lesson in Year 5 and repeated in one lesson in Year 6):

• The function of egg and sperm cells.

All sessions are part of a wider health and transition topic, which explores how children feel about and deal with change in general. It is, therefore, handled with great sensitivity and **is age-appropriate**.

If your child is in Years 5 or 6 and you would like to withdraw them from the lesson that includes egg and sperm cells, as outlined above, please complete the attached withdrawal form.
